
The WGC Spring Meeting was held at Ladbroke GC




There was a wonderful welcome for our members from the Ladbrook GC members and staff

Everyone agreed that it was a splendid day in spite of the weather interfering along the way with wind and rain to test the golf concentration.



### Ladbroke Park Golf Club

### The Foundation of Ladbroke Park

The Club called a General Meeting on 29th May 1908, to present plans furnished by Messrs. Chamberlain, King and Jones for a new clubhouse, according to a report in the *Birmingham Gazette*. Its facilities included a club room, ladies' tea room and dining rooms, smoke room, bar, locker room, lavatories and cloakroom. There were also two billiard tables. A Miss Wheatley of Penn Lane, Hockley Heath undertook the catering, for which she required twenty-four hours notice in writing.

Mr RT. Byrne had accepted the presidency of the Club and presented The President's Challenge Cup for competition. A second cup was presented by a Mr. P. Kellett and a medal by Mr. WG. Newman. A draft of the club rules and regulations was circulated for approval. By the end of the year there were 204 members and forty-two ladies.

The first Annual General Meeting was held at the end of March 1909. The auditors reported that a satisfactory start had been made, the balance sheet showing a healthy situation. The number of lady members had risen to fifty. New greens had been laid arid it was expected that the course would be ready by the end of May. The clubhouse was under construction and members were asked to subscribe at least a £1 share towards the cost of £1,400.

Mr RT Byrne was formally elected president, holding that office until 1914,

Mr E Spencer, Captain, Mr. WG Stewart, Honorary Treasurer and Mr. HC. Church, Honorary Secretary. He remained in office for some time, his residence listed in *Nisbet's Golf Year Book 1912* as Wake Green Road, Moseley.

Oscar Bowen opened the new clubhouse on 19th March 1910. The ceremony was followed by lunch and a match between teams selected by the captain and the secretary, the latter's team winning fifteen points to twelve. After the match there was a supper, "a splendid spread", at which toasts were given, followed by a smoking concert. The *Stratford-Upon-Avon Herald* reported that "proceedings were most enjoyable and successful".
